NCPS Shared Learning Resource

This month's learning resource is a de-identified event highlighting the challenges found when providing inpatient care for bariatric patients. In addition to the challenges of care when inpatients, discharge planning for this group of patients is difficult. The Nebraska Hospital Association in conjunction with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services is working on a pilot project for the transfer of patients with complex medical needs from eligible acute care hospitals to the appropriate post-acute care setting (LB227 sec 63). Bariatric patients are included within this category of patients with complex medical needs. We look

forward to the results from the pilot group to help inform on strategies to improve the inpatient discharge of bariatric patients.

Learning Opportunities for NCPS Members

New Help for Dealing with Aggression in People With Dementia - The DICE Approach

Dementia is often thought of as a "memory" disorder yet behavioral changes such as agitation, depression, aggression, hallucinations, and wandering are nearly universal in those with dementia. These behaviors can cause stress and depression in the caregivers/family members of these persons. A newly launched website provides resources for caregivers of those with dementia.

The DICE Approach represents a simple but systematic method for understanding, assessing and managing behavioral and psychological symptoms in dementia (BPSD). DICE is an adaptation of the reasoning process used by dementia behavior experts and numerous research trials involving behavioral management skills training for family caregivers.

The free training teaches methods to manage behavioral symptoms [forms.ihi.org] including agitation, wandering, and aggression. Access to the webinars included in this program may be found on the AMA EdHub which you can access here.
